

## Anne Remmer Thompson C.S.P.W.C.

Anne Remmer Thompson, born in Ottawa, is a watercolour painter and teacher, specializing in landscape and floral painting. Her style could be called dramatic realism. In 1999, she was selected as a member of the very exclusive Canadian Society of Painters In Watercolour (C.S.P.W.C.).

As a child she was chosen to study at the National Gallery. Later she studied Art History extensively at Carleton University, oil painting at the Ottawa School of Art and watercolours with Jack Reid and John Bennett. She has painted locally with Leonard Gerbrant and Brodie Shearer, amongst others and attended workshops conducted by Zoltan Szabo, Barbara Nechis, Christopher Schink and Brian Atyeo in the process of developing her own distinctive style.

She is a past president of the Ottawa Watercolour Society, of which she is a fellow and currently an executive advisor. She is also a past president of the Bells Corners Art League.

Anne is called upon, annually, to critique paintings for the art associations of Ottawa, Nepean, Kanata and others of Eastern Ontario.

Having received wide recognition in Ottawa and Eastern Ontario, Anne has won numerous awards and prizes. Her several solo shows in local galleries have been most successful and she has participated in many two-person and three-person shows in Ottawa and Toronto.

Anne has taught art-related subject matter for the Ottawa Board of Education, has given private painting classes and has taught watercolour classes for the Kanata Art Association for several years. She has also conducted a weekend workshop at the Ottawa School of Art for the Ottawa Art Association.

Exhibiting continuously with several Ottawa and eastern Ontario galleries her paintings can be seen in the permanent collection of the Corporation of the city of Ottawa, the City of Gatineau, the Family Care Workers of Ontario and in hundreds of public and private collections throughout Canada, the United States and Europe.
